In Memoriam

North DeKalb Lions ask regarding the death of Edwin C. Daniels:

"Not 'What was his church?' Nor 'What was his creed?' But 'Had he befriended Those really in need?' But 'How many were sorry when he passed away?' "

Lions in 1930 numbered 80,000 in 2200 clubs in all U.S. Stares, provinces of Canada, and Mexico. In the mid 1930s the Lions continued even with deficits in their treasure.

A Leader Dog School was founded in 1939, located at Rochester, Michigan, 25 miles north of Detroit, and eventually increased its service throughout the nation. By 1940 membership had climbed to 120,000 members in 3,432 clubs in eight countries. In 1945 membership was 218,181 in 4,856 clubs in 14 clubs and geographical areas.

International Outlook

During World War II Lions had 24,000 members in the military forces. In 1945 the Lions were one of 42 international non-governmental consultants in the formating of the United Nations. Lions Club International is the only civic consultant that has a special day of recognition annually at the United Nations, when winners are announced of the Lions World Peace posters, submitted by children ages 11, 12, or 13, from among ten official languages from around the world.

Achievements by Working Together

In 1949 Lions of Georgia established the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation, Inc., founded by Tom Bingham and Morgan Raiford. International membership in 1950 was 402,841 in 8,055 clubs in 28 countries in geographical areas, and in 1960 a membership of 613,376 in 15,077 clubs in 91 countries and geographical areas. Melvin Jones died at age 82 in 1961, after 44 years as a Lion.

The Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) was established in 1968. Serious charitable grants were increased in the '80s and '90s.

Membership in 1970 was 906,579 in 24,391 clubs in 126 countries and geographical areas. In 1980 membership was 1,288,398 in 33,864 clubs in 146 countries and geographical areas.

The beginnings of the Georgia Camp for the Blind were in 1975, first supported by South Georgia, and then by the whole Multiple District 18.

The Lions Leader Dog program or developing "Seeing Eye" dogs became a part of the Multiple District District 18 district governor's goals in 1976. International Director Austin P. Jennings developed a task force to organize new clubs. In 1984 the

Multiple District 18 district governor's goals in 1976. International Director Austin P. Jennings developed a task force to organize new clubs. In 1984 the Multiple District 18 discussed the development of a united Eye Bank at Augusta and Emory. As a successor to the Georgia Lions Eye Bank located at Emory, the Georgia Lions Eye Tissue Services, Inc., was developed at Emory in 1992.

In 1990 at the Lions International Convention at St. Louis the SightFirst thrust of LCIF was authorized, and in 1993-94 Campaign SightFirst raised more than U.S.\$150 million toward a \$130 million goal, to help stamp out blindness worldwide, in projects to be implemented by LCIF over more than a decade. Georgia received LCIF grants in the tornadoes of 1993 and floods of 1994.

Membership in 1990 was 1,368,991 in 39,415 clubs in 166 countries and geographical areas, and on December 31, 1994 was 1,410,019 in 42,408 clubs in 701 districts in 178 countries and geographical areas. Lions in six districts in Georgia number approximately 8,500, in approximately 295 clubs.

In 1993 Lionesses and other women were invited to become Lions. International Directors and Presidents reflect the worldwide organization of Lionism.

The influence of Lionism has inspired newer civic organizations to be formed with somewhat more limited principle and activity, and not reaching the Lions record of sight conservation and public service.

OUTLINE OF LIONS HISTORY

Research by Jim Panter and others

Roots for the organization of Lions Clubs International go back to the cooperation of Melvin Jones and William P. Woods, who enlisted local business and civic clubs to work together.

The first coordinator of local Lions clubs was William Woods, but the promoter of Lionism was Melvin Jones, who was born in 1879 at Fort Thomas, Arizona. He lived in various places as his father worked with the U.S. Army.

Earliest Clubs

In his business contacts in Chicago in 1911 Melvir Jones joined "The Business Circle" (BC), a businessmen's luncheon club. He quickly became its secretary, widened its influence, and became catalyst for a narional organization.

In 1915 when San Antonio was the largest city in Texas, boasting 120,000 population. Frederick Terrell and Sam Weller and others organized a "Lions Club," but changed its name in 1916 to "City Club."

William P. Woods, M.D., a surgeon from Evansville, Indiana, and others incorporated a nonprofit organization by the name of the International Association of Lions Clubs (IAOLC) in Indiana, Oct. 24, 1916.

Lions International

In May 1917 Melvin Jones of the Business Circle invited several civic clubs to meet at LaSalle Hotel in Chicago to consider joining together, including the Opeimist and Exchange clubs, and the Lions Clubs (IAOLC).

He wrete to Dr. Woods and his clubs to attend "with a view of lining up our organization with yours." By June 1, 1917 IAOLC had 35 member clubs.

Clubs that attending the meeting, June 7, 1917, included the Lions (IAOLC), the Vortex club of St. Louis, MO, the Business and Professional Men of St. Paul, MN, and the Business Circle (BC) of Chicago. The Exchange club did not attend. There were 27 Lions clubs that were represented with Dr. Woods at the initial June 7, 1917 meeting.

After this exploratory meeting, Melvin Jones, on June 19, 1917 wrote the Ardmore, Oklahoma Lions club inquiring about the Business Circle joining the Lions. On Aug. 2, 1917, Melvin Jones received the charter for the BC club to become the Chicago Lions club.

Early Lions International Conventions

Dr. Woods called for a Lions Convention to convene Oct. 8, 1917, at Dallas TX. The Lions Objects, and the Lions Code of Etnics were adopted, and official organization of Lions Clubs International was constituted with Dr. Woods as first president.

In 1919 a Denver lawyer, Halstead Ritter, spoke at the Lions International Convention in Chicago, on the acronym of the word "Lions", used ever since: Liberty, Intelligence, Our nation's Safety." In 1920 Lions numbered 6,451 members in 113 clubs in two countries.

Sight Conservation

At the Lions Convention in 1925 at Cedar Point, Ohio, Helen Keller challenged Lions to be 'Knights of the Blind,' and the challenge of sight conservation has been a major emphasis ever since.

In the 13th year in 1930 President George A. Bonham recommended the blind use white canes, and started a movement to give those using white canes, and started a movement to give those using white canes the right of way in traffic. All states adopted such laws by 1956.

Union County Leo Club

Union County Lions are sponsoring a Leo club for youth age 12 and over. Len Bivins, president Union County Lions, says the club will direct the "tremendous talent and energy" of Union County Youth to "view the needs of the community from a definite perspective. Lions will advise them, but they will be free to design their own projects, elect their own officers, and have their own budget."

Lion Michael Thompson, who is coordinating efforts to establish the Leo club, reminds the public that Lions clubs have fostered youth activities for many years, and are the largest single sponsor of Boy Scout units in the world. Leo clubs have been organized in high schools since 1968.

Relate to School Officials

School representatives attended a Lions Youth Outreach meeting, October 3, 1994, in Dawsonville club with former Drug Awareness Chair Bill Sperry as speaker. Present at the meeting were Primary School Principal Nicky Gilleland. Counsellors Karleen Sheets and Leigh Orr, and Dawson County D.A.R. E. coordinator from the sheriff's department, Billy Carlisle.

Lion Sperry described drugs as a factor in increasing youth crime, teen pregnancies, automobile accidents by teens, and teen suicide. He described the QUEST program designed to improve life and citizen skills.

Dawson County Lions are sponsoring Tara Sewell, a junior at Dawson County High School, as a delegate to the National Youth Leaders Conference to be held in Washington, D.C., Dec. 6-11, to witness the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of the federal government in action.

The projects are part of the Lions extended youth outreach to young people in 1994-95. Club President Joe Hirsch is District 18-D chairman of Lions Youth Outreach.

Peachtree Projects

Peachtree Lions of North Atlanta held a garage sale at the home Margaret Battle, Oct. 28-29. The club has developed a Lions information brochure that is distributed at fund-raising activities.

Ervin Stresses "Choice" In Lionism

Lions International Director James E, Ervin from Albany Lions club, issued the challenge "to choose to help yourself by helping someone else," speaking at Gainesville Lions club's anniversary banquet at Holiday Hall, June 25, 1994. Lion Jim illustrated how Lionism has grown by a series of choices and priorities

First he noted the choice in the United States of the acronym "Liberty, Intelligence, Our Nation's Safety." He said Lions have combined intelligence and imagination, to develop new forms of service, and quoted Albert Einstein that "imagination is more important than knowledge.

Lion Jim praised the USA/Canada Forum to advance understanding of broader and newer avenues of service. He quoted the hockey player who said "100% of shots never taken are those never attempted."

The choice of each Lion to accept an invitation to join and to be involved and to serve and to pay dues. Lion Jim characterized as the heart of Lionism.

The widening choices he listed included in 1920 becoming international by entering Canada, in 1925 accepting Helen Keller's challenge to be "Knights to the Blind," in 1930 adopting the white cane as a symbol of the blind. 
