We also should continue to look ahead and make our plans for those successful projects that make Lionism well known in the community.

January 13, 2007 is a special day for Lions everywhere. It is the birthday of the founder of Lionism, Melvin Jones. The clubs of District 18-B have been asked to raise community awareness of Lions Activities on this day. This could be a neighborhood broom sale, it could be a crafts sale or a garage sale. Have vou thought about a vision and hearing screening or maybe just putting together a Diabetes Awareness and health awareness display in a shopping center or mall. It is important for Lions to maintain good name recognition. Time is short to plan this project and we need as many clubs as possible to participate in this activity. Once you have decided on your project for January 13th, please publicize it in your local newspaper. Get your local radio station to run PSA announcements. Lets spread the word about Lionism by having a project on this day. January 13th is on a Saturday and will be recognized by the State of Georgia as Lions Day in Georgia.

And as we prepare for the year 2007, we have a number of events that require our attention and plan-

ning. As mentioned in the Governor's Comments, District 18-B will have its District Convention in February. At this convention, the district will be conducting elections of officers for the Lions year 2007-08. This year the elections will be for District Governor, Vice District Governor, and Vice President of the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation. All of these positions must be nominated by the club of the nominee (or a majority of clubs in the District) no later than 30 days prior to the convention.

The qualifications of each office are as follows:

Vice District Governor– Must be a member of good standing in his/ her club. Must have served on the club level as President of the club and one additional year as a director of the club. Must have served on the district level at least one year as Zone Chairperson, Region Chairperson, Cabinet Secretary, or Cabinet Treasurer. The term of office is one year with the option of serving as District Governor the following year.

District Governor– Same as Vice District Governor except on the District level, must have served two years, one being Vice District Governor. When a standing Vice District Governor is seeking this office, no other candidates may be considered.

Vice President of the Georgia Lions Lighthouse Foundation– The qualifications to serve as Vice President are the same as serving as Vice District Governor plus the candidate must have served as a District Director or Trustee for a majority of a three year term. This office has a term limit of two, two year terms. Vice President Jim Ward is completing his second two year term and is ineligible for reelection.

Office that do not receive nominations 30 days prior to the convention will be nominated from the floor.

If you are interested in serving Lionism in a higher capacity, please consider serving as a leader of District 18-B.

Come Home to Chicago

The 90th International Convention will be held in Chicago, Illinois, USA. Come home to Chicago— July 2-6, 2007—where the association began. December 31, 2006 is the deadline for early registration. International convention is an opportunity to network with Lions from around the world and to share ideas for service. It is an opportunity to vote on the association's future, talk with headquarters staff and attend seminars on a variety of topics.

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Club Reports

<u>Alamo</u> The Club President helped a community member with expenses for travel to Savannah for an Eye Exam. Lion Mike Hayes received a 25 year Monarch. Several members volunteered time to help the Wheeler County Elementary School's Fall Festival.

Bellville Club worked 158 hours on club administration and 157 hours on community projects. They sent \$250 to Leader Dog, \$250 to RFB&D, \$530 to LCIF, \$250 to the Lighthouse, and \$646 to the Camp.

<u>Bloomingdale</u> Near perfect attendance. Worked 60 hours on community projects.

Bulloch– The club continues to place U.S. and Georgia Southern Flags. The club received a banner patch and letter from LCI for club growth. They are planning to purchase a TV/VCR for the Brooklet Police Department.

Douglas– Average attendance is 58. Club worked 55 hours on club administration and 925 hours on community projects. Had 1 publicity item, spent \$2,200 on local eye services. Collected 3,514 used eyeglasses. Their Leo Club held a successful BBQ Festival. Had programs on the Camp and the Lighthouse. They are planning to ring bells this holiday season. **Folkston** Average attendance is 10, they worked 800 hours for the community and spent \$150 for local eye services. They sent \$75 to GLASB and sponsor a Peace Poster contest. They are conducting a Christmas Basket Drive.

Golden Isles— Average attendance is 13. Spent \$250 on the Community and worked 41 hours. This was in support of a Christmas Party given for the children of military personnel who were recently or is deployed in the Middle East. They are working on their annual Steak Dinner on January 19th.

<u>Hinesville</u> Average attendance is 28, worked 40 hours on club administration and 338 for the community. They spent \$155 on the community, \$200 to the Lighthouse, \$200 to the Camp. Collected used eyeglasses. They purchased 60 Liberty Day Booklets.

<u>Jacksonville</u> Club worked 6 hours on club administration, average attendance is 10. They spent \$100 on the community. They raised \$396 for Send a Kid to Camp Day.

Lyons– Club worked 32 hours on club administration and 36 hours on community projects. Average attendance is 18. Club provided 1 pair of glasses and spent \$100 on the community. Sent \$425 to LCIF. They displayed flags in the community.

<u>**Rincon**</u> The club recycled 3 1/2 tons of paper. They helped a local

family with a gift card to cover season's expenses.

Savannah– Average attendance is 22. The club is working on their Christmas Tree project with the help of the Leos of the Knight Riders Leo Club.

<u>Waycross</u> Average attendance is 18. Club worked 88 hours on club administration and 15 hours on the community.

<u>Waycross Okefenokee</u> Average attendance is 35. Club collected used eyeglasses. Sent \$100 to GLASB.

Wilmington Island– Average attendance is 15. Worked 115 hours on club administration and 62 hours for the community. Spent \$100 on the Community and \$420 to LCIF for Contributing Memberships. They published 5 items. They partnered with Senior Citizens to collect blankets. This activity resulted in Radio and TV interviews. The club also entered a float entitled "Gifts from the Lions" in the Rincon Noon's Annual Christmas Parade.

<u>Woodbine</u> Average attendance is 28. They worked 37 hours on club administration and 62 hours for the community. They sent \$350 to GLASB and \$125 to the Camp. They hosted zone meeting on November 13.

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Club Renewal: Expanding Our Mission of Service

Lions clubs must continually grow, to never cease reassessing the manner in which they relate to their communities.

Consequently, it is vital that every club engage in a periodic renewal, a time to revitalize itself. In doing so, the club will be energized to both provide services that are relevant to the community and meet the personal needs of not only the current membership, but men and women who are considering an opportunity to give of their time and talents in voluntary service.

Let us make 2006-2007 the Year of Club Renewal and, in a word, "reinvent" ourselves through new ways of thinking and conducting business. If we are to move forward and enhance our image as the community's premier service club organization, we must, when necessary, replace old assumptions and attitudes that have outlived their usefulness and develop new ideas and approaches to community service that do, indeed, promise success. I encourage every Lions club at its very first meeting to closely examine everything that it does...service projects, membership growth, relationships with other community leaders and organizations, the way meetings are conducted...anything that relates to the strength and future of the club. There are, in fact, three precise steps to identify how to most effectively meet the needs of both current and prospective members.

First, determine which of your activities are successful and create enthusiasm within the club. These should obviously be continued and, whenever possible, expanded. Also, I know that Lions dislike the thought of abandoning a project, especially one that has been a part of the club's calendar for many years. However, if, on serious examination, it no longer answers community needs and is unsuccessful, it simply must be dropped and replaced with a new program. All this is essential to what I call the Paradigm Shift.

We cannot maintain activities and practices that are outdated and of little value. It is our responsibility as Lions and as community leaders to continually develop and implement innovative service projects and workable strategies to bring in new members. The best strategy for growth, I assure you, is to implement activities that members, and potential members, consider serious and important. In this way, and only this way, will we strengthen our clubs through membership growth. However, it demands a rigorous self-evaluation of where our clubs are and where we want to go.

Let us permanently leave behind the concept of "but that's the way we've always done it!" This absolutely has to be stricken from our method of operation. New ideas must replace those that no longer work, and this can only occur when club members participate in open and constructive discussion. This is the open path to club renewal and development, and it will happen when Lions come together to honestly evaluate their situation and determine a course of action for tomorrow. This can only be achieved at the club level; it cannot be established from above. Each club must set its own targets for success, in both activities and membership growth. Analyze what is best for your community and for your fellow Lions, and then judge how you can go about reaching these objectives.

A serious evaluation of your club is the key. Employ the three-step approach for club renewal and there is no question that you will be able to look forward to a bright and positive future.
